

Amazing Rehabbed and Repurposed Pieces

Rehabbing or Repurposing village pieces has nothing to do with making a village video. Or does it? If your village video has **things in it that viewers haven't seen before**, it's likely that you will attract more views.

I've done my share of **amateur** repurposing with signage and repainting, but there are some serious Christmas village folks out there who can create amazing buildings. These tend toward Christmas in the City collectors, but there are always exceptions to the rule. Some of the folks with Christmas in the City displays want/need the fancier stores of NYC. So, they make their own! Many of these amazing rehabs appear to be the work of artisans!

One of the first I ever saw was Red Misha (Misha Franco) taking a D56 Dayfield's Department Store (#808795) and by just using signage he changed it into a Macy's. Notice that he gave the shoppers Macy's bags, too.

Or you could take Hollydale's Department Store (#55344) and make a Macy's with a little extra paint. Four of these corner stores placed together make a city block department store, an idea I stole.

There is a Facebook group called Village Rehabs that has 1,587 members. Allow me to show you what is possible. The typical tools for rehabs are a Dremel tool to open windows, good painting skills, a toolbox of miniatures and color photos to fill the windows and brand the outside signs, glues, and clear plexiglass to finish the windows.

There are lots of pages to follow. Don't worry, they're mostly pictures and very little you will need to read. Follow me into the wonderful world of rehabbing!

Aside from Misha Franco, one of the best rehabbers I've seen is April Okerholm from Austin, Texas. She took a perfectly good D56 Harley-Davidson® Manufacturing (#54948) building, worth \$50 to \$254 on eBay, and turned it into a Chick-fil-A restaurant (the D56 original version goes for \$425 to \$450 on eBay).

She took the Kringles Toy Shop from the D56 Saturday Morning Downtown (#54902) set and turned it into a beautiful Tiffany & Company store.

Another rehab by April was D56 Foster Pharmacy (#58916), worth \$45 to \$157 on eBay, changed into a Rose Apothecary shop.

Here is a rehab by April that was D56's Mrs. Stover's Bungalow Candies (#58917), worth from \$25 to \$160 on eBay, changed into a Godiva chocolate shop.



April took a D56 Lionel Electric Trains (#54947) shop, worth \$19 to \$160 on eBay, and made a Harry Winston jewelry store.

Here is one that shows her imagination. Let's start with a D56 Main Street Medical (#55306), worth \$65 to \$162 on eBay, and change it into a Cartier store with an adjoining Starbucks and upstairs Monolo Blahnik store.

Or let's take the D56 Spam Museum (#06225), worth \$25 to \$60 on eBay, and transform it into H-E-B Fresh Foods grocery store, a Texas food store chain.



How about a D56 1986 Carriage House (#50717), worth \$25 to \$54 on eBay, changed into a Chanel store? This rehab required some major Dremel tool porcelain removal.

In this April rehab she shows us an intermediate step after the Dremel tool has been used. She took a Polaris Snowmobile Dealership (#55078), worth from \$60 to \$200 on eBay, and transformed it into a Manolo Blahnik shoe store.







How about the D56 Prairie House (#51560), worth \$25 to \$75 on eBay, to an Amore Italian Restaurant?



Do you have a spare D56 Sterling Jewelers (#58926) building? Worth \$75 to \$106 on eBay, April remade it into a Cartier Boutique.





Just a couple more April Okerholm rehabs. I'm unsure what the original buildings were, but why not have a Louis Vitton store and a Hooter's Restaurant?





This was a big one – a D56 Hunting Lodge (#54453), worth \$23 to \$200 on eBay, transformed into a Cabela's store!

Misha Franco, a.k.a. Red Misha, is the most prolific rehab artist and sells urban stores on a Facebook site. Misha is a graphic artist by trade. The rest of these examples are mostly his. He started with several D56 Snow Village Bakery corner buildings (#50776), worth \$19 to \$116 on eBay, and created urban high-end shopping.





He shows us the steps needed to complete the transformation in this series of photos.



Here is another transformation from Red Misha.





More Tiffany & Company stores.







Rosaria Costa created a Tiffany's store with an accompanying figurine rehab.





Here are a few rehabs using the D56 Clark Street Automat (#58954), worth \$38 to \$160 on eBay.




